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Going Green at Episcopal

“Going Green?” Exactly what does this mean?

At Episcopal, going green means significant, concrete initiatives. “Becoming a green school is not a political agenda. It is a commitment to stewardship of our environment and resources,” said Will York ‘81, EHS Director of Operations. The Administration and Board of Directors are dedicated to improving the environmental sustainability of our campus. From curriculum and student led service projects to buildings and grounds - EHS is going green!

The first step in Episcopal’s green initiative was the completion of its strategic plan which reflects the school’s commitment to a healthier campus environment. Episcopal became a member of the U. S. Green Building Council, which has developed a national ranking system, known as LEED, for environmentally friendly, or green, buildings. LEED stands for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design and is the benchmark for the design, construction and operation of green buildings. LEED professionals have an impact on building performance through their whole building approach

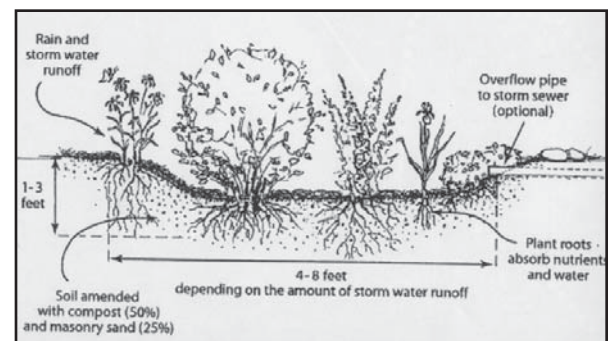
incorporating the five identified areas of sustainable development, water savings, energy efficiency, materials selection and environmental quality.

Episcopal is especially proud to announce that Will York ‘81 has earned the designation of LEED Accredited Professional. Episcopal is the only school in Louisiana with a LEED Professional on staff. York’s certification represents an important step forward in the “greening” of our campus.

Another exciting initiative addresses the storm water management on campus. On a rainy day, muddy bogs and water-filled pools exist all around campus! Ask any middle schooler to describe their quad after a heavy rain! You’ll certainly hear the words “mud” and “run-off” in their answer.

A solution to this problem has resulted in a unique partnership. Episcopal has joined forces with the Baton Rouge City-Parish Planning Commission, Louisiana State University Hilltop Arboretum, the Louisiana Department of

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Letter from the Head of School

I went to school back in the day when students were required to memorize a lot of poetry, especially in the sixth grade. While it was agonizing at the time, waiting for the moment when I'd have to stand and recite, I still remember those poems. In the springtime, especially, their words come back to me. There was Wordsworth's "Daffodils," and there were others.

"I wandered lonely as a cloud
That floats on high o'er vales and hills,
When all at once I saw a crowd,
A host of golden daffodils;
Beside the lake, beneath the trees,
Fluttering and dancing in the breeze."

Almost every poem referred to nature, celebrating the poet's connection to something that resonates in all of us—a response to the natural world.

In *Last Child in the Woods: Saving Our Children From Nature Deficit Disorder*, author Richard Louv describes our current world, a world in which children have less and less contact with nature. In our world, the experience of childhood has become mitigated through technology or lost through a tightly scheduled day. No longer do children have the freedom to play outside until dusk with their friends. "Yet, at the very moment that the bond is breaking between the young and the natural world, a growing body of research links our mental, physical, and spiritual health directly to our association with nature—in positive ways. Several of these studies suggest that thoughtful exposure of youngsters to nature can even be a powerful form of therapy...As one scientist puts it, we can now assume that just as children need good nutrition and adequate sleep, they may very well need contact with nature."

So far, the phenomenon described by Louv does not seem to be entirely true for the students at EHS. Many of our students still enjoy time on the water fishing and

skiing. Often, weekends are spent at family camps. Nature remains a part of their vernacular, their common language. But this language, the language of landscape, is becoming increasingly fragile, especially here in southern Louisiana.

This issue of On Campus is dedicated to the "greening" of Episcopal's campus. What does that mean exactly? It means we are dedicating ourselves to making the campus more liveable in a rainstorm and more comfortable all the time. It means we are planning to use cutting edge knowledge to retool our aging campus systems and, in the long run, conserve both the School's bottom line and our natural resources. It means, that as a school, we have gained a new understanding of what it means to be responsible for the next generation.

Sustainability initiatives for Episcopal-Baton Rouge organize themselves around three imperatives: the ethical imperative, the educational imperative, and the community imperative.

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The ethical imperative. As an educational institution with a strong moral and ethical focus, Episcopal has a special and profound responsibility to teach by example. Modeling sustainability on campus goes far beyond implementing best management practices. It speaks to reconnecting the entire EHS community (students, parents, faculty and staff) to the geography of Louisiana and to a commitment for its preservation. As an Episcopal institution, it is our mission to be good stewards of God's creation: to understand, to celebrate, and to protect life-sustaining processes and natural systems.

The educational imperative. Louv's work eloquently speaks to the educational importance of connecting students to the natural world. But what of the classroom experience? As the campus is transformed

into a model of sustainability, the bricks and mortar, the quadrangles and covered walkways—all will be tools that will help reduce Episcopal's "footprint" as well as being used to educate our students in best practice. In addition, empirical evidence has shown that students learn better, that test scores improve in classrooms whose air quality, temperature, and lighting are adapted to LEEDS standards.

The community imperative. One initiative in Episcopal's Cornerstones program is the use of the campus itself as laboratory, demonstrating sustainable "best practice" to the wider Baton Rouge community. Our membership in the U.S. Green Building Council and Will York's certification as a LEED AP (Leadership in Environmental Design—Accredited Professional) are the beginnings of this process. In addition, EHS hopes to do more than its part in preserving Louisiana's rich environmental heritage through its conservation work.

Of the poems that continue their verdant life in the recesses of my memory, another surfaces in the spring. Longfellow's "Evangeline" haunts me forty years later, now that I have come to love southern Louisiana and now that I have learned what is at stake here.

"This is the forest primeval. The murmuring pines and the hemlocks,
Bearded with moss, and in garments green, indistinct in the twilight,
Stand like Druids of old, with voices sad and prophetic...
This is the forest primeval:...
Where is the thatch-roofed village, the home of Acadian farmers—
Men whose lives glided on like rivers that water the woodlands,
Darkened by shadows of earth, but reflecting the image of heaven?
Waste are those peasant farms, and the farmers forever departed!
Scattered like dust and leaves, when the mighty blasts of October
Seize them, and whirl them aloft, and sprinkle them far o'er the ocean.
Naught but tradition remains of the beautiful village of Grand-Pre...."

Pictured above is the master plan for our campus. Endorsed by the Board, this plan recommends the addition of new buildings, renovation of current buildings, and the reconfiguration of roadways along with other exciting changes. As Head of School Kay Betts explains, “Many of us need a little extra care after we turn 40, and the same is true for our campus.” Contributions, not tuition dollars, will fund the plan which will be implemented in stages over a period of years. The rain garden and cistern will be the first undertaking with the work scheduled to begin this summer.

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Environmental Quality and BROWN+ DANOS Landdesign, Inc. to apply for a grant to construct bioswales, a rain garden and cisterns project to recycle rainwater. Besides solving the storm water problem, the project will provide opportunities for Episcopal to create an educational program and field work for our students, students of other schools and city residents.

Other green initiatives at Episcopal include: an energy audit of existing campus buildings to determine where our greatest needs lie, new school buses that meet federal requirements to protect the environment, use of cleaning products that are environmentally friendly, incorporation of environmental lessons into the curriculum in every division, and food packaging that reduces waste.

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT: KATIE STERNBERG '88

Katie Sternberg '88, has been actively working with environmental concerns since earning her undergraduate degree from Emory University in 1992 and masters in Conservation Biology and Sustainable Development from the University of Wisconsin –Madison in 1998.

Katie began her career “out in the middle of nowhere” serving for 10 weeks as a naturalist intern on a National Audubon Society preserve in an isolated Kentucky field. Since that humble beginning, Katie has worked as the Programs Director for Keep Texas Beautiful in Austin, Texas, Earth Share of Texas, and The Trust for Public Land. Katie has also done freelance work for the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center/ Native Plant Society of Texas, TreeFolks, Global Routes, Interlocken, Environmental Defense and the Center for Maximum Potential Building Systems.

Katie is currently in the process of starting her own environmental business.

What do you find most fulfilling about your work with environmental issues?

I love the range of subjects you can pursue in the environmental realm. I've been involved with jobs ranging from conservation work on nature preserves to the redevelopment of potentially contaminated properties (“brownfields”) in blighted urban areas, to community litter cleanups, recycling, and beautification. It's rewarding and fun for me to work on projects that provide some tangible environmental and social benefits.

What are some of the challenges you face in your work?

One of the biggest challenges is that most people grow up and live in cities with no exposure to, and, therefore, little or no awareness of natural areas or the interconnection between healthy natural systems and our urban lifestyles. On top of that, people have busy lives and stressful priorities, which make environmental issues seem like secondary or background concerns. There is a lot of work still to be done to promote environmental awareness.

My job in an educational capacity is to help create a sense of connection and encourage people to carry out positive

action – while trying not to sound like the eco-police. I certainly can't hold myself up as a measuring stick of the perfectly sustainable lifestyle – we're all on a continuum of constant improvement.

As more environmentally-friendly innovations and lifestyle changes are adopted, we are moving toward the recognition that the decisions and actions that benefit the health of the planet are the most viable choices to support our economies, health, and quality of life.

What has been a particularly memorable moment or experience during your career?

One evening on the Kentucky preserve, my co-worker and I went hiking on the trails. It was completely dark out except for a pretty good size moon, and we walked the entire preserve without our flashlights. It was completely tranquil, and the views and noises were totally different than what we had experienced during our work in the daytime. I don't know why this memory is one that I remember as a particular turning-point, but that internship was the most isolating experience I'd ever had. That night was the first time I felt an appreciation for being totally out of my element.

How did your years at Episcopal prepare you for your current job responsibilities?

I had to put in a fair amount of effort to keep up with my coursework at Episcopal, so I think it taught me the discipline of working hard, especially to compete with some of the other students who seemed to know so much so effortlessly. Running cross country and track taught me how to balance my time and set personal goals. The expectations my parents set for achievement also tended to be pretty high, so I'm sure that contributed to any current goal-setting skills I practice now.

Do you think your Episcopal education gave you any advantages during college? If so, what were they?

My favorite teachers at Episcopal did a great job of teaching students how to think - to really analyze, process, and even reframe the subject so that we didn't rely on memorization as our key to learning.

Is there an experience, class, teacher, or coach from your years at EHS that stands out as having a significant impact on the person you are today?

Mr. Longeway required the class to bring an interesting newspaper article for discussion in class each Friday. I don't know that I fully appreciated the assignment at the time as more than an interesting break from the routine, but his effort to bring the “real world” into the classroom is one of the things I appreciate now. Participating on the cross country team with Mrs. Tydor (now Crawford) was one of my favorite high school experiences – she was a fantastic coach and really created a sense of team spirit and cooperation in a sport that can be very individualistic.

If you could speak to Episcopal students today, what would you want to tell them? What practical ways would you suggest to students to motivate them to be positive leaders in environmental sustainability issues?

I think the general message of sustainability, “We've only got one planet, so we need to take care of it”, is pretty pervasive in modern thought and communication. But there are still significant gaps between words or intent and action. Environmental concerns can seem like overwhelming problems that are totally out of your hands. The overarching challenge is big – but that means that the opportunities to figure out and implement solutions are incredibly numerous, with so much room for your energy and creativity. It's important to figure out what means something to you and act on it, even in small steps. You can add more steps and bigger steps as you're ready. Focus on what inspires you, have fun, laugh, be dedicated, learn as you go, and bring others along with you.

Nancy Callaway, Episcopal's 6th grade math teacher, earned national certification this year. The Guild made the initial purchase, while the school pays for the yearly maintenance cost of the devices.

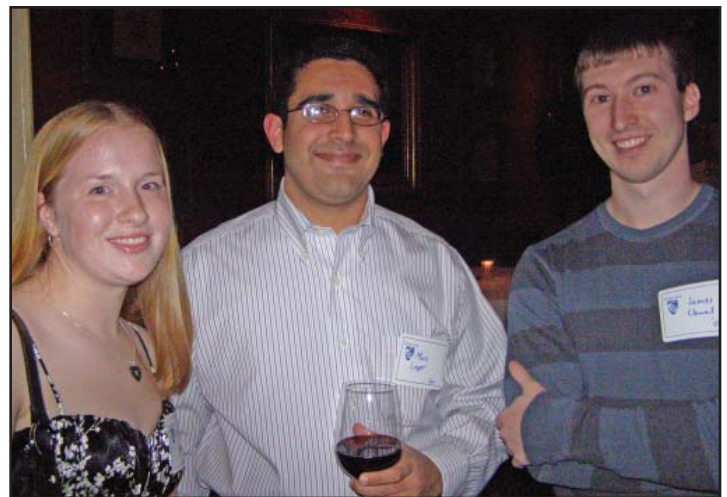

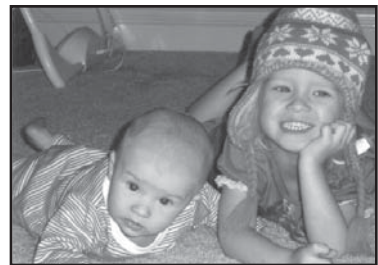
